

CODE OF CONDUCT

Non-Discrimination Policy

Radnor Soccer Club and the Radnor Soccer League do not discriminate against its members, players, coaches, parents, referees on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, disability, sex, gender identity, religion, reprisal, political beliefs, marital status, familial or parental status, sexual orientation, or if all or part of an individual's income is derived from any public assistance programs.

Players' Code

- Respect your opponents, your coach, teammates, parents and yourself.
- Appreciate skillful play by others.
- Be a positive force and help others on your team.
- Challenge yourself to improve your skills and fitness to be all that you can be.
- Respect the game of soccer.
- By following the code of conduct you will be a credit to your parents, your school, the Radnor Soccer Club, your coach, your teammates, and most importantly, yourself.

Parents' Code

- Remember soccer is primarily for your child's enjoyment.
- Teach your child to play by the rules.
- Show your child the value of hard work and fair play, rather than just the need to win.
- It is in preparing to win and doing our best to win that the battle is won.
- Help your child to develop a good attitude on and off the field. Set a good example.
- Do not publicly question a referee or coach on their decisions.
- Do not offer coaching tips or directions from the sidelines. They confuse players.
- Keep cheering to promote general, and positive, encouragement.

Coaches' Code

- Begin with the end in mind: that is to develop kids with character through soccer.
- Communicate realistic expectations for skill development and play to parents and players.
- Be respectful of referees, opponents, your players and parents at all times.
- Be sure that you and your team shake the hands of opponents and referees after games.
- Good coaches are always learning. Watch and listen to your team for those lessons.
- Set high standards of conduct for your team on and off the field.
